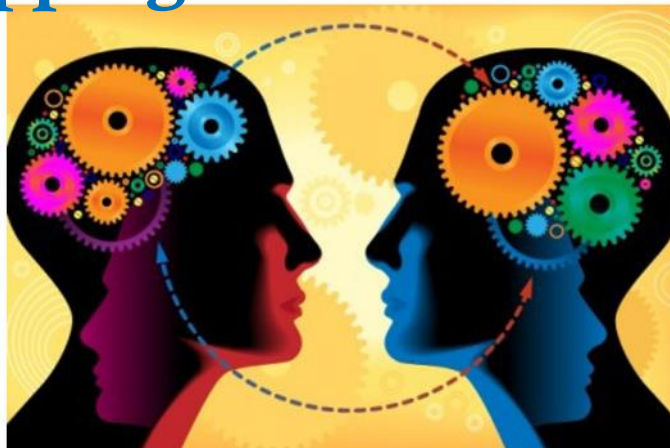

Using Kahoot:

Student Engagement, Assessment, and Data Collection

First, we'll show a couple of examples of how we use Google Docs for group essays, article summaries, vocab journals, and in situ feedback on writing. Then we'll get a lively discussion going and share our ideas on our own Google Doc. Everyone will leave with new ideas to try!

This presentation will focus on the myths and truths surrounding Arabic speakers and their ability to write in English. Amal Barzanji, a graduate student at UCF from Saudi Arabia, will present research about the challenges that Arabic speakers like herself have faced with writing. She and Rebecca Sandy, her former teacher, will share innovative strategies for teachers who need answers to help their Arabic students.

Lights, Camera, Action! Effective Strategies for Using Videos

This session will be a true discussion of effective strategies when using videos in the classroom, whether that classroom be online or face-to-face. Participants will have a chance to share their own findings and strategies with the group and learn about free or low-cost ways of adding videos to courses.

This session will report on a study which examined the differential effects of direct and metalinguistic written corrective feedback on four different grammatical errors. Best practices for writing instructors will be discussed based on current research in L2 writing.

Activities for Developing Cross-Cultural Awareness

Critical thinking and multimodality have been of interest in second language acquisition (SLA) research. Few studies have examined the intersections of critical thinking and multimodality in ESL. We present ways to teach and assess students' comprehension of multimodal texts and critical thinking skills using a question-making activity on Bloom's taxonomy and Visual Thinking Strategies.

Six Degrees of American Culture

This presentation will outline a multi-level class designed to teach aspects of American culture using the 1990's Pop Culture game Six Degrees of Kevin Bacon as a springboard for a session long project. The project allows learners to use skills in speaking, listening, reading, presenting, and research.

AR-PA Cubes (Augmented Reality - Pedagogical Agent)

ES 216

AR (Augmented Reality)-enhanced learning is an innovative form of instructional technology that enables students to experience a real-time view of a physical world augmented by digital learning content. Grounded in constructivist and situated learning theories, AR-enhanced learning allows students to play proactive roles in a wide range of learning activities within interactive educational scenarios. Such gained learning experiences can form the basis for reflection and group discussion in a classroom. The ARPA system will consist of five AR-enhanced touchable learning cubes and mobile devices that deliver multimedia contents and 3D models to student.
